Coach's Corner

Hold the Line—Should I Stay or Should I Go?

Experienced pickleball players know that the first team to dominate the no-volley zone (NVZ) is in a strong, offensive position. The team at the NVZ should try to pin their opponents back on the baseline as this tactic improves their chance of winning the rally and/or scoring a point. One of the most common errors I see net players make during a rally is backing off the NVZ line to hit a shot then **NOT** returning to their position at the NVZ, while their ball is in flight. Stepping back six to twelve inches and staying there creates more angles, space and time for the opponents to use against you.

Of course, there are exceptions to a quick return at the NVZ line. For example, you may want to step back when you are anticipating a fast-paced ball from your opponents. Stepping back gives you more time to react, providing an opportunity to reset the point. Again, provided you did not pop the ball up, return to the NVZ line before the ball crosses the net.

Strategically, when at the net you want to hit balls out of the air as this takes reaction and decision time away from your opponent. However, when your opponent hits a high 3rd shot drop and you are unable to take the ball out of the air, you should step back and let the ball bounce before returning it.

Remember, offensive play at the net takes patience. Your goal is to hit a shot that allows your team to control the NVZ setting your team up for the next ball.

Pickleball question of the month

When a shot is to my far left side and I know I can't reach it with my paddle in my right hand, I switch to my left. When I do, I grab the paddle by the edge and make my shot. Another player told me I cannot do that, is there a rule for this?? Answer:

Yes, and you can! Rule 11.O. Paddle Possession. A player must have possession of the paddle when it makes contact with the ball. A violation of this rule is a fault. Editor's Note: There is no rule against not holding the handle. Even if the ball hit her finger, hand, or wrist, while holding the paddle, the ball is still live until it hits the ground.]

A Little Bit on Etiquette

Golf etiquette, written and unwritten, could fill several pages. Pickleball etiquette is still evolving. We go to the net after the game to touch paddles and murmur words of love to our opponents. When our court's stray ball enters another court, we holler "Ball!" so that no one is hurt ---two examples of current etiquette.

I propose an unwritten rule for the etiquette of returning an errant ball to the proper court, to an opponent or even to our own partner. Pick the ball up off the ground with your hand and baseball throw it, underhand toss it, or direct it with your paddle to the proper player. When getting the ball to your opponent when it is their serve, try to make sure they are aware it is coming. Get that ball where it needs to go accurately and with compassion. That means no smacking it with your paddle so it rolls along the ground or kicking it like a soccer player. Bend down, pick the ball up like the kind human you are! Focus on the player who will be serving and send it to him/her on a happy one bounce so there is no need to bend over or move extra yards to retrieve your possibly inaccurate swat of a ground ball. Why do TWO people need to bend over to pick up a ball? If one bends, picks it up and delivers it to a fellow player so that the player easily receives it without bending, what a wonderful world this would be--especially for us old(er) people!

A synonym for Martha Applegate...A person who takes action when she sees a need. Her actions include not sitting back in retirement and just relaxing. She has volunteered in Juarez for at least six years bringing supplies, money and relief to people who are refugees from many areas in Mexico and Central and South America. She has made at least five trips from Santa Fe in her trusty van. Her longtime friend Lilia Whitener, who used to live in Santa Fe, coordinates these efforts from Juarez. Martha has been able to spring into action helping families who are trying to reach the US, or just trying to move through Mexico searching for a better life. Fellow picklers Cynthia Feiden-Warsh and Diana Thatcher have accompanied Martha on one of her many trips to Mexico. Martha's refugee asylum work through Juarez with Lilia's local guidance continues to be a driving force in her life.

At the end of the summer, Martha again leaves for Juarez to continue her work with refugees from Central America and an orphanage in San Carlos, Mexico. Martha is seeking donations for families, especially children's clothing, men's clothing, sturdy shoes, luggage, small household items like towels, sheets, pillows, and new underwear and socks. Martha's charity efforts are not surprising given that her work career for the State of New Mexico in social work started in Farmington, then Las Cruces, and eventually in the mid-80's to Santa Fe. Her work started in the area of adoptions and morphed to the Department of Health. Her specialties involved 25 years of home visits throughout her territories. With each year in New Mexico, her love for her adopted home and the people grew. Martha retired from the State of New Mexico when she turned 50 in 2004 ready to start her next life chapter. While in Santa Fe Martha raised an adopted daughter who has brought her so much joy!

Another interesting adventure that Martha is involved in is the Wildlife Rescue program in San Carlos, Mexico. She wants to continue these efforts because she loves learning about these creatures.
